Proposed procedure to promote the participation of "Olympic Glories" at Wava World Championships.

1. It must be matter of athletes who are:
  - a) widely still famous in the world
  - b) still good performers in their traditional event
  - c) Olympic gold medal or World record holders not before 1960.
2. The program of promotion should have a budget of USD 10.000 taken from the WAVA/IAAF special budget + USD 10.000 allocated by the local Organisers.  
(A request to get an additional allocation of 10.000 USD is pending at the IAAF).
3. A first selection of athletes to invite will be done by the Wava President and Secretary upon suggestions received from the Council members with particular regard to the Area representatives, from the local Organising Committee and the IAAF Secretariat (in case the IAAF 10.000 USD are effectively allocated).  
The maximum number of invited athletes will be 10, in any case keeping in the limits of the specific budget.
4. The athletes shall be taken into consideration only if satisfying all of the three requirements under point 1 a) b) and c). After that, absolute priority shall be given to those names coming from countries where the evolution of the veterans activity needs a particular promotion. For instance new affiliates, or potential affiliates, from Africa, South and Central America, Eastern European Countries, some Asian areas. In other terms the Olympic Glory should be invited with priority from those countries where the event of his/her participation could be an important event in his/her country and get much local interest from mass media, to give place to a promotion for other Veterans in that area, otherwise it becomes a matter of elitism in our Championships, which is not the purpose of the operation.
5. Before implementing the invitations, the proposal prepared by the Wava President and Secretary, will be eventually submitted to the local O.C. and to the Council. In case of divergencies the decision of the Council shall be final. A postal vote could be required.
6. Contacts with the athletes shall be made by the Wava Secretary with the help of the IAAF daily office, if needed. Noone can be given money. The invitation shall be based upon providing a free ticket for the cheapest flight + accommodation 10 days in Hotel three stars or equivalent. The Olympic Glories shall be entered their events without any entry fee or Wava fee.
